### What is the Kawagoe Festival?

#### History A festival with a tradition of over 370 years

The Kawagoe Festival was designated as an Important Intangible Folk Cultural Property of Japan in February 2005 under the name of the Float Festival of the Kawagoe Hikawa Matsuri Festival and was included on the UNESCO Intangible Cultural Heritage List in December 2016. The festival started in 1648, the Keian period, when Matsudaira Nobutsuna, the lord of the Kawagoe Domain at the time, contributed the lion's face masks and mikoshi (portable shrines) to Hikawa Shrine. Three years later, the mikoshi first paraded through the neighborhood. The citizens joined in at the tail end of the parade. Those are the roots of the current Kawagoe Festival. At that time, Koedo Kawagoe had a close relationship with Edo through Shingashigawa-River transportation. Soon, the style of the Festival was deeply influenced by the Edo Tenka Festival and began to feature the pulling of spectacular festival floats. While the festivals in Edo switched to using mikoshis principle, the Kawagoe Festival carries on the tradition of the old Edo Tenka Festival to the present.

Hikkawase

Hikkawase is one of the highlights of the

Kawagoe Festival. When a float passes

another float, they perform Hikkawase as a

greeting between townspeople. A particular

highlight of the festival is when several

floats gather at an intersection and the

stage rotates to face each other, creating a

spectacular musical performance. During the

nighttime Hikikkawase, when lanterns are held

up and cheering for the musicians is heard, the mood of the festival reaches its climax.

14 Ladder Acrobatic Performance

Sat. •Around 18:20 - 18:40

In Kawagoe Festival, you can enjoy traditional ladder acrobatic performance. The audience erupts in applause and cheers each time the skill of the performers is demonstrated.



14 15 Hikkawase

When the festival floats meet each other, they face the front and play hayashi music together. Japanese lanterns are swung vigorously. and the festival reaches its climax.


15 Festival floats parade in front of the city hall
